Deadlines for Withdrawing from Classes in Summer:

The last day to withdraw (grade of “W”) from a class in Summer 2025 is August 14, 2025.

Any student who drops or withdraws from a Summer class on the last day of the session attended will be responsible for payment of 100% of the tuition for the class.

Failure to drop or withdraw from a class by the deadline will result in a grade of “UW” for the class. A grade of “UW” will be calculated in the cumulative GPA as a grade of “F”.

Admission to Claremont School of Theology

All students wishing to enroll in a Summer 2025 class for academic credit who have not previously enrolled at Claremont School of Theology and students who are registering for

Advanced Course of Study credit must complete a [Non-Degree Application](#) for Admission on the CST website.

Please note that Non-Degree applicants, except for the Cross-registrants, including students interested in taking a class for Advanced Course of Study credit, will be required to provide proof of completion of a Bachelor of Arts degree.

Students who have been admitted to Claremont School of Theology for the Fall 2025 semester and have confirmed their admission may register for the Summer 2025 without completing a Non-degree application.

Summer 2025 Course Descriptions

IDM 438 – Transforming Self and Educational Ministry in the Multicultural World

The course will be a practical seminar in helping students engage in each learning process as participants. Students will experience the critical thinking on themselves and the Christian Ministry in Korean society that faces multicultural and multiracial changes. This course will provide participants three dimensional opportunities including to reflect their inner selves utilizing cognitive behavioral theories, to analyze Korean situation of the immigrant, and to practice engaged learning process for transformative ministry. The language of instruction for this class is Korean.

IDM 4034 - Interpreting Conflict, Healing and Reconciliation in the Old Testament

As a course of the Doctor of Ministry Program in Practical Theology related to Conflict, Healing, and Transformation in Korean Contexts, this course will provide students with biblical foundations for dealing with contemporary conflict, healing, and reconciliation topics. For this aim, students will read several texts from the Hebrew Bible/Old Testament to identify problems/issues of the text and estimate how much the textual scope gives the reader interpretational freedom. Then, the course introduces various contemporary perspectives to ponder the methodologies with the critical examinations of hermeneutics. Based on these observations, this course will eventually help students make a new interpretation within the textual scope and use that interpretation to propose a practical project in their ministry. The language of instruction for this class is Korean.

TSC 4046/4049 Spiritually Integrated Psychotherapy Internship

Required clinical training for D. Min and Ph.D. students in the spiritually integrative psychotherapy track. Completion of one unit of Clinical Pastoral Education and an evaluation acceptable to the professors of spiritual care and counseling are prerequisites. Students serve as Interns/Residents at The Clinebell Institute (TCI). No other placements are allowed, except those arranged by TCI. Clinical training begins in late August with a required three-day staff meeting and retreat. Training continues for a full calendar year, unless the student graduates. Students are expected to complete their required training without interruption. The clinical training program at the TCI does not follow the academic calendar; due to the intensive nature of the training and the needs of clients, students are on a year-round schedule and continue to serve their clients during school breaks, though vacation times are arranged through TCI. If students' training must be interrupted due to unforeseen life circumstances, students must make up the time missed within 1 year from the time of interruption. In addition to the weekly meeting time, students schedule clinical work, research, and study in preparation for clinical service, individual supervision, and other training meetings as required
