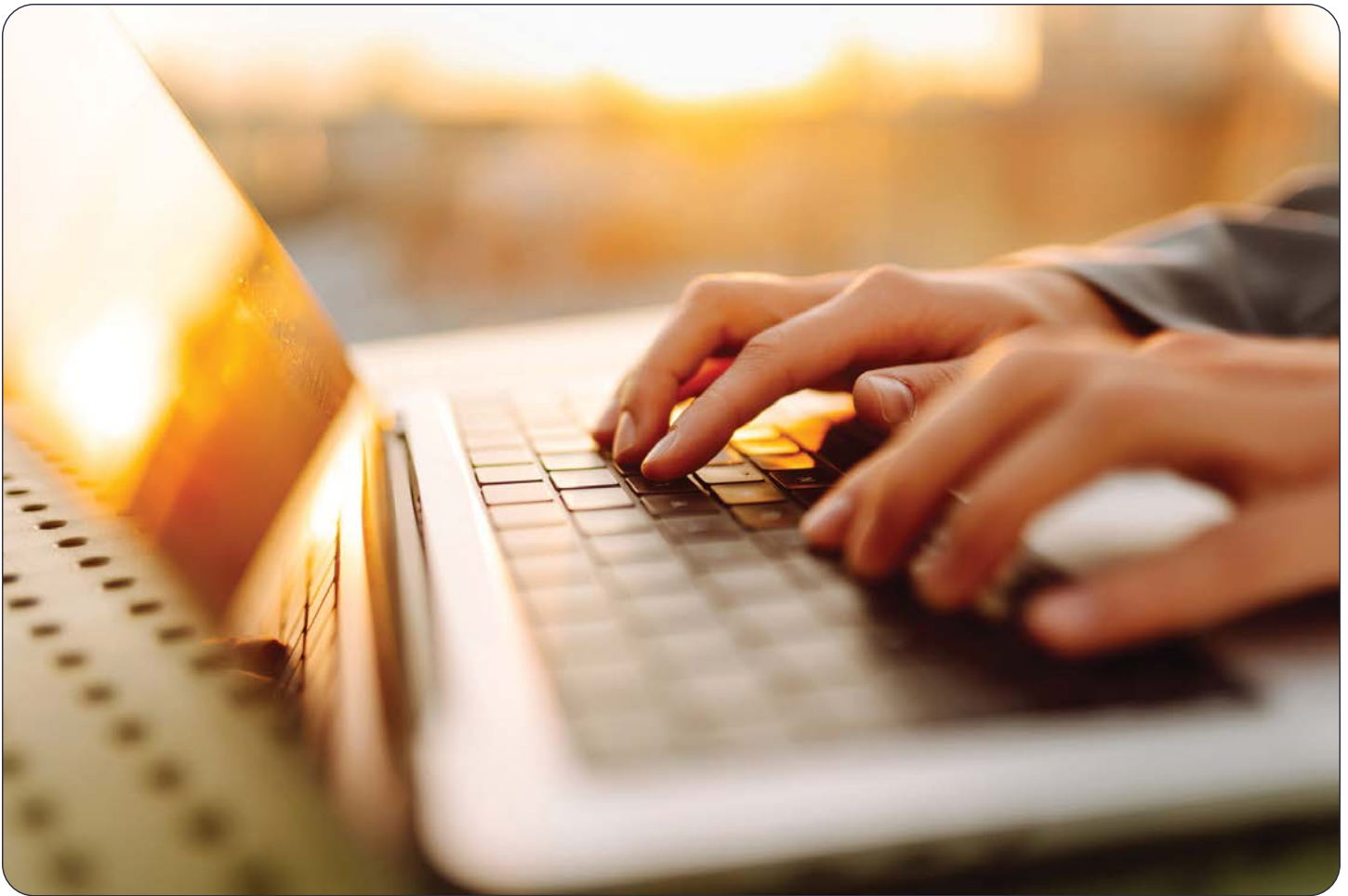

Congregational Renewal: Leading Faithful Change in the Local Church

Description of Class:

Congregational renewal is not a one-time event—it is a process that unfolds through shared discernment, courageous leadership, and faithful experimentation. This month-long intensive course is designed for small teams of clergy and lay leaders from the same congregation who are ready to engage that process together.

This experience combines theological grounding, practical tools, and real-time application. Rooted in Wesleyan theology and shaped by the realities of today's church, the course invites participants to move beyond quick fixes and into sustained, Spirit-led renewal.

Each week includes a live teaching session, guided small-group conversation, and a practical assignment that participants complete with their church team. This format ensures that learning is not abstract, but immediately connected to the life of the congregation.

Over 5 weeks, participants will:

- *Assess their congregation's current reality and vitality*
- *Explore Wesleyan theological foundations for renewal and transformation*
- *Learn to interpret congregational systems and culture*
- *Identify opportunities for innovation and fresh expressions of ministry*
- *Design and begin implementing a 90-day renewal experiment tailored to their context*

By the end of the course, each team will have developed a contextualized Congregational Renewal Plan, along with the leadership alignment and practical next steps needed to move forward.

This course is ideal for congregations seeking not just new ideas, but a structured pathway to faithful, sustainable change—grounded in theology, shaped by community, and practiced in real time.

Who Is the Class For:

Small teams from local churches, ideally between 3 and 5 people, including the pastoral leader and others in leadership roles. Solo registration is possible, but work between class sessions will need to involve others in leadership roles at a church.

Re-imagining Church Properties for Affordable Housing

Description of Class:

When the time comes to imagine new uses for your church campus, you may wonder if affordable housing is the answer. Affordable housing advocates will tell you that church land is one of the most important available assets for addressing the housing crisis, and your colleagues may know of congregations that have been blessed by multimillion-dollar payouts.

But it's complicated.

This three-session course explores what it takes to move from vision to reality. Through inspiring success stories, hair-raising accounts of projects that have struggled, and clear, practical guidance, participants will gain a grounded understanding of how churches can responsibly engage in affordable housing development.

Sessions will cover discernment and mission alignment, common pitfalls and risks, and the essential building blocks of a project—from partnerships to financing to community engagement.

Whether you are just beginning to ask “could we?” or already exploring a project, this course will help you move forward with clarity, caution, and hope.

An Integrated System Approach to Outreach: *Connecting Congregations with Non-Church Households*

Description of Class:

The class will focus on bringing theology and practical application together to shape a ministry plan to connect with non-churched households.

The class will provide a process for a local congregation to analyze their current mission statement and how it shapes its evangelistic efforts to connect with non-church households within the Wesleyan tradition.

This will be followed by determining the demographic and socioeconomic similarities and differences between the church congregants and the non-churched households in the ministry area. Included is financial, religious, and ministry application information.

Following the July 29 session, the team will conclude their activity by designing a ministry effort to implement in the fall. This ministry effort will be presented at the August 25 class session.

Called to Proclaim: Foundations for Faithful Preaching

Description of Class:

Recognizing that the word preaching can feel intimidating or narrowly defined, this course invites participants to broaden their understanding of preaching as both a sacred responsibility and a practical craft. Participants will reflect on their own story, calling, and theological grounding while developing foundational skills for proclamation.

Through guided reflection, biblical engagement, and hands-on learning, participants will explore the purpose of preaching, the identity and formation of the preacher, approaches to biblical interpretation, and practical frameworks for crafting clear, faithful, and relevant forms of proclamation, including sermon structures, testimony, and personal witness.

By the end of the course, participants will leave with a stronger foundation for proclamation, increased confidence in their voice, and practical tools they can apply in a variety of contexts.

The class is open to laity and clergy, with an emphasis on foundational skills for proclamation.

Leading Faithfully: Pastoral Presence and Prophetic Imagination

Description of Class:

This short-term course engages the practice of prophetic leadership as it emerges through pastoral presence, communal discernment, and faithful action. Grounded in Scripture, Wesleyan theology, and United Methodist ecclesiology, the class explores how leaders are called to respond creatively and courageously to the complex realities facing congregations and communities in the current social-political climate.

Participants will reflect on leadership “for such a time as this,” attending to the intersection of pastoral care, prophetic witness, justice, and adaptive change. The course emphasizes discernment of context, listening deeply to congregations and communities, and leading with integrity amid uncertainty, polarization, and transformation.

Through conversation, guided reflection, and practical case studies, participants will be invited to deepen their understanding of prophetic leadership as a relational, pastoral, and Spirit-led practice within the connective life of the United Methodist Church.

This three-session format is designed to be formative and collegial, supporting participants as they reflect on their own leadership vocation and current ministry challenges.

Who Is the Class For:

This class is intended for clergy, local pastors, and lay leaders who are navigating change, transition, or complex leadership realities in congregational, district, or extension ministry settings. It is especially suited for leaders seeking to integrate pastoral engagement, prophetic imagination, and Wesleyan leadership practices in their current context.

Participants from diverse ministry settings, cultural contexts, and stages of leadership experience are welcome.
